## OES Employment and Wage Description

Field	Field Description
<b>Employment</b>	This is the estimate total number of workers employed in a specific occupation. This is not the number of employees from companies responding to the wage survey.
<b>Entry Wage</b>	This term refers to the average wage paid to those in the bottom third of workers in an occupation. This is an imputed wage measure rather than a surveyed measure. Not Official BLS Estimates.
<b>Average Wage</b>	The average, or mean, data reflect a weighted mean. To derive the weighted mean, the hourly wage of each employee in a specific occupation is totaled and then divided by the number of employees. Usually high or low wages can inflate or deflate the average wage.
<b>Median Wage</b>	Median wage (or the 50th percentile). The estimated 50th percentile of the distribution of wages based on data collected from employers in all industries; 50 percent of workers in an occupation earn less than the median wage, and 50 percent earn more than the median wage.
<b>Middle Range (25th &amp; 75th Percentiles)</b>	All wages reported in an occupation for each worker are arrayed from lowest to highest: the middle 50 percent of the workers is the middle below the low end of the middle range and one-fourth of the employees are earning wages above the high end. This range provides the user with information regarding the variance of pay within an occupation.
<b>Percentile Wage</b>	A percentile wage estimate shows what percentage of workers in an occupation earn less than a given wage and what percentage earn more. For example, a 25th percentile wage of \$15.00 indicates that 25 percent of workers (in a given occupation in a given area) earn less than \$15.00; therefore the remaining 75 percent of workers earn more than \$15.00.
<b>Statement</b>	The Idaho Department of Labor has provided several extensions to the official OES data series, which have been developed in cooperation with the Bureau of Labor Statistics. These additional products have not been validated by BLS and are not, therefore, official BLS data series. The Idaho Department of Labor feels, however, that they provide additional information that is useful to the users of Idaho Department of Labor data. These extensions include 1) Geographic coverage: "Idaho Labor Regions" and 2) Type of estimation: "Entry Wage."
