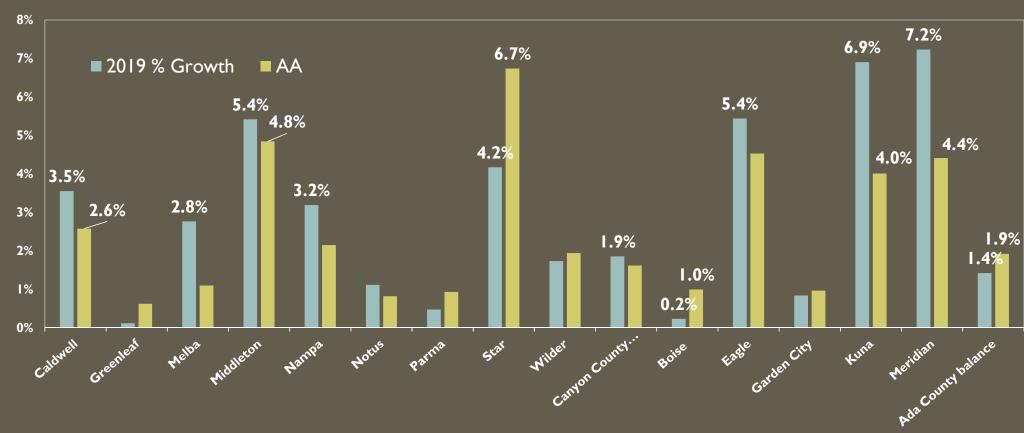

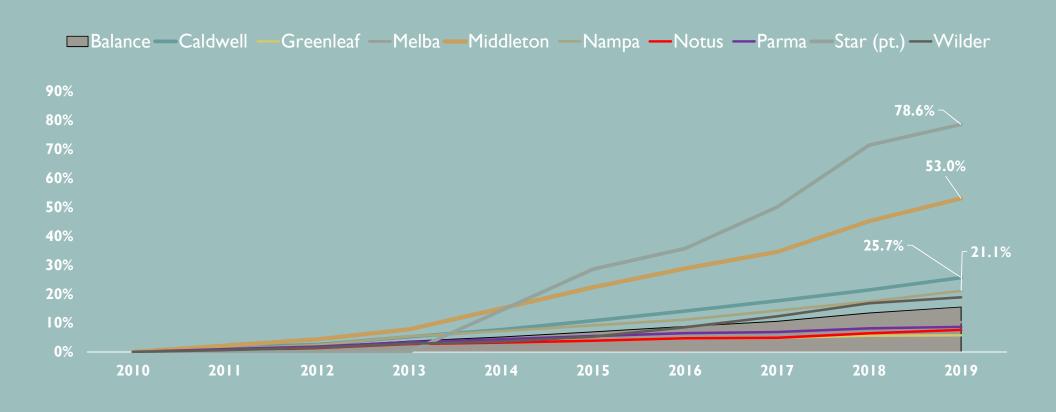
2019 POPULATION GROWTH





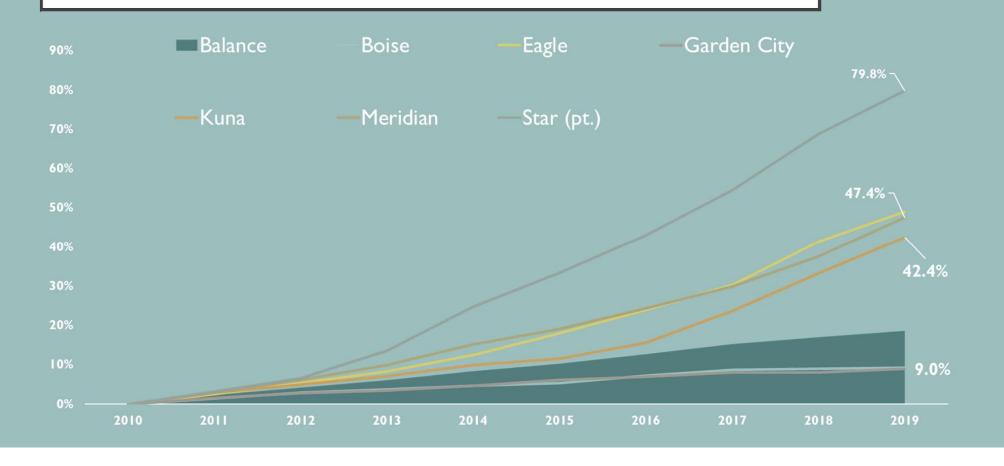
CANYON COUNTY CITIES GROWTH SINCE 2010





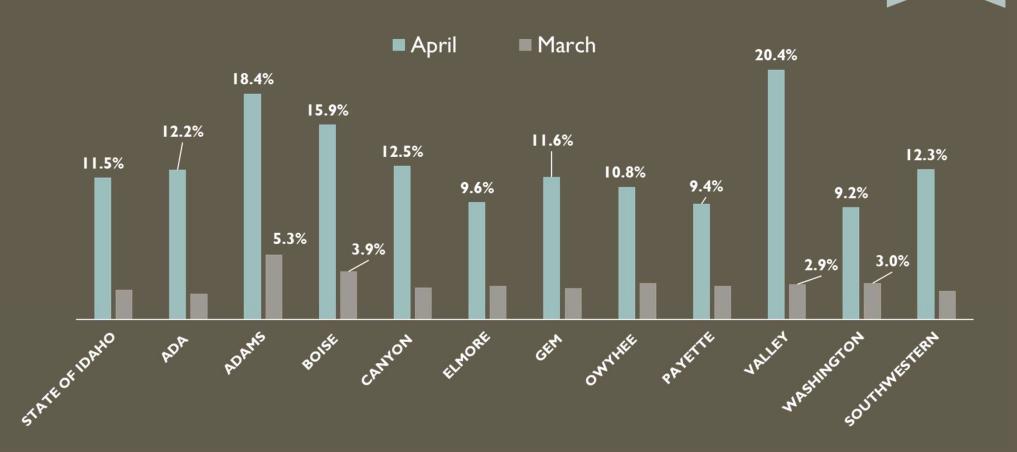
ADA COUNTY CITIES GROWTH SINCE 2010





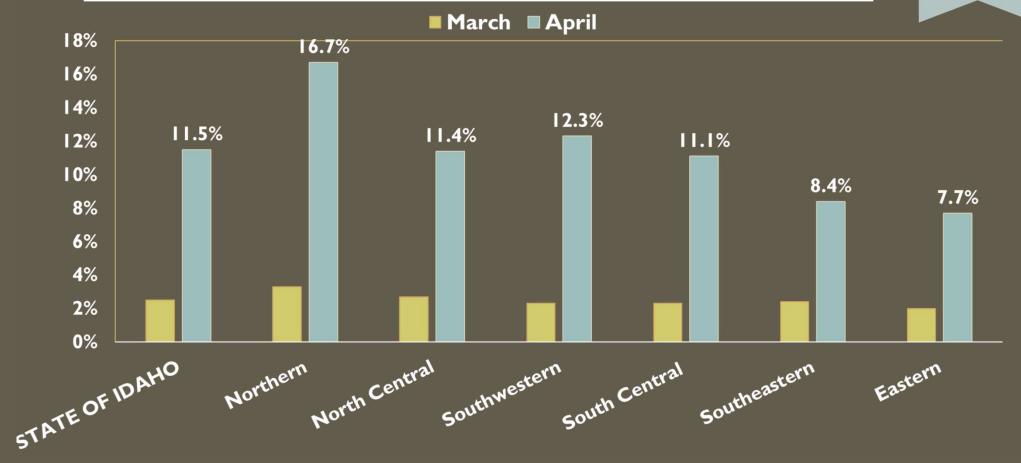
UNEMPLOYMENT RATES MARCH AND APRIL 2020





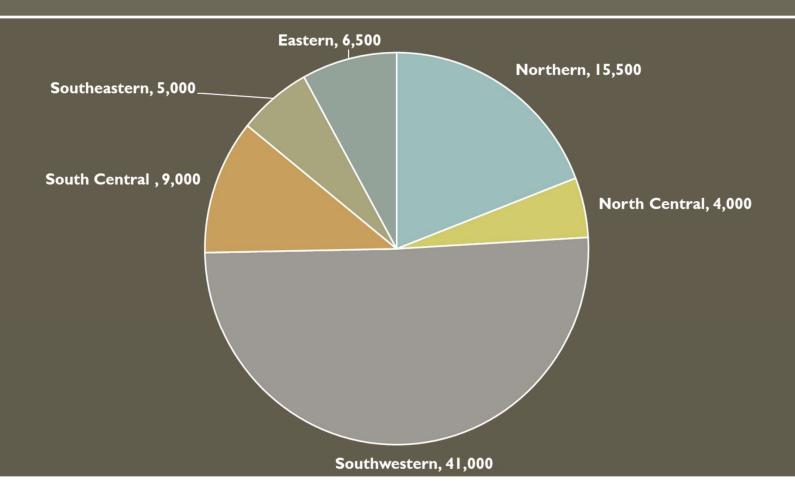
REGIONAL UNEMPLOYMENT RATES





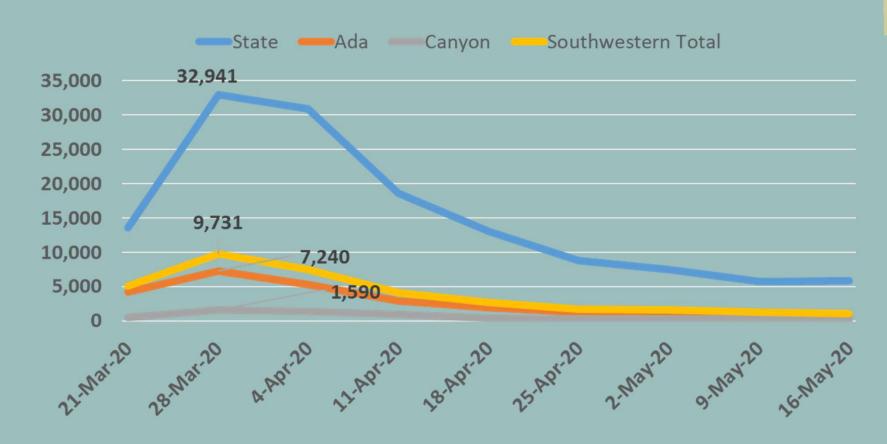
UNEMPLOYED CHANGE MARCH > APRIL STATE OF IDAHO CHANGE = 81,000





INITIAL UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS BY WEEK

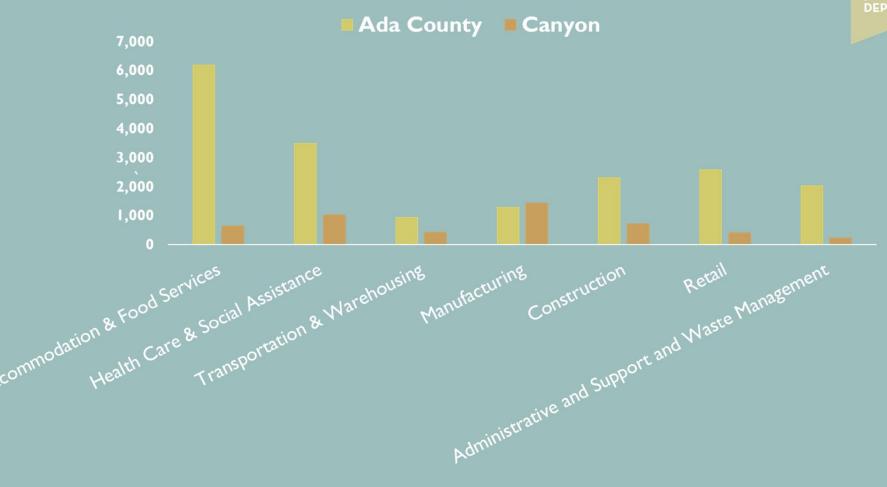
